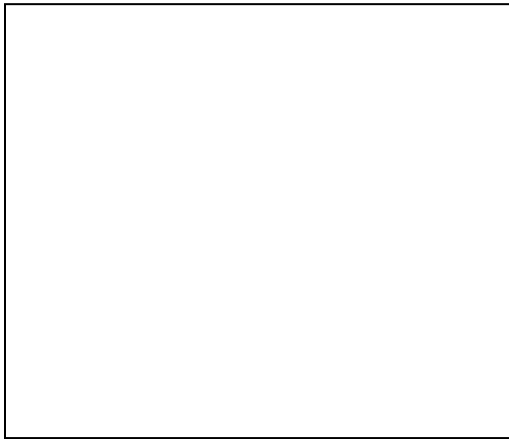

1. Letter formation is tricky for some young students, but also very important. The habits that are formed now will be the foundation for efficient/fluent writing later. Attached to this week's homework you will find a letter formation chart. We would like you to keep it in a safe place to use as a reference when doing writing at home with your child. The dot shows where the letter begins and the arrows show which direction to go. Above each letter is a verbal cue that you and/or your child can say to help them remember how to form the letter correctly. Please monitor your child's writing and help them to regularly form letters in the correct way.

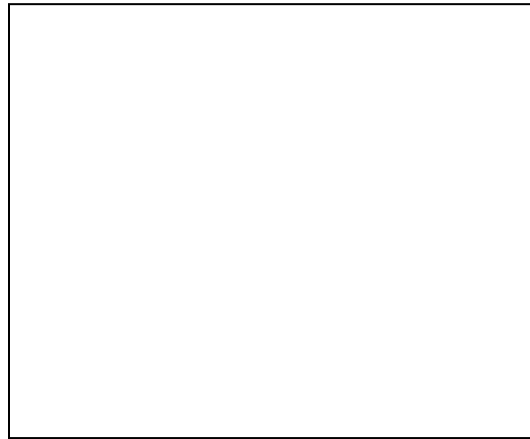
On the back of this paper please practice writing the letters using the attached chart to make sure your child is forming the letters correctly.
